# **CCRA Celebrates Our First Year**

The first Annual General Meeting of the Association was held on 17 September and attended by over 60 residents, a great turnout. We welcomed residents from two new roads, Fossdene Road and Frank Burton Close and hope they will join our committees and social activities.

A presentation about the work we have been doing over the year, our successes and social activities, was followed by Question Time. This provoked a lively discussion and residents put their questions to Nick Raynsford, our MP, Councillor Gary Parker, Commander Christopher Jarrett from the police, and Colin Brown, CCRA Chair. People asked about several issues of local importance: crime, road surfacing, parking fines during

Thames Water works and resources for the local Safer Neighbourhood Team.

In response to questions about making ours a safer and friendlier community, panel members emphasised the importance of getting to know and support one another. Commander Jarrett strongly supported the Association and the work of our Law and Order Action Group and emphasised that, although our area is bordered by serious crime, CCRA's area is not itself such an

area. He acknowledged that the work of the Safer Neighbourhood Team had been limited by lack of personnel but the team has now been brought up to full strength. He gave a personal commitment to investigate examples of poor response from the team and also offered to allow a member of CCRA to shadow the Safer Neighbourhood Team officer - watch this space!

A question was raised about the best way to get information to the police anonymously. The Borough Commander advised that it would depend on the nature of the situation. In an emergency, then 999 was still the best way to contact the police. A new telephone number will shortly be made available by the Metropolitan Police Authority for general enquiries which will be supplied to CCRA along with his contact details. The Borough Commander was then asked what he considered were the most significant crime issues in the Charlton area. Sadly, knife crime does figure along with youth crime and burglary. However the Borough

Commander advised that this area does not suffer as much as other parts of the Borough.

Nick Raynsford said that there needed to be a swift response to anti-social behaviour and Commander Chris Jarrett and Councillor Gary Parker suggested that CCRA look at setting up or collaborating with a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme. Other questions concerned road resurfacing and neighbourhood services. Apparent lack of coordination between Thames Water, parking and highways services led a questioner to ask 'who is in control?' Elliscombe

Road has recently been resurfaced, badly according to residents, but will soon be dug up again for Thames Water work. Nick Raynsford acknowledged people's concern about a lack of "joined up thinking". He also commented on the need for better communication between transport services, for example when both the main line and the Jubilee line were closed at the same time for maintenance.

A number of further questions that were raised about street cleaning and rubbish collection are being actively taken up by our environment committee. *(continued on back page)*

# Time For a Big Clean-up!

It's been very messy in our streets so far this year, with Thames Water working everywhere, new housing being built in Victoria Way and some lousy summer weather. Our representations to councillors helped a bit, but replacing the water mains was always going to cause major disruption. However by next summer Thames Water should be finished in our neighbourhood, the housing will be completed and a big priority for CCRA will be to get the place cleaned up.

We have a right to expect good surfaces on the roads, safe pavements, clean gutters and drains, lights that work and tidy street signs. This doesn't just mean going back to where we were before all the work started; in some roads it needs to be a lot better than for many years. So, as Thames Water finishes its work, CCRA will be pressing for good quality resurfacing of roads, tighter Cleansweep operations which have been affected, and at least a start to a programme of improvements.

An ongoing partnership with local council departments is the key to making this happen but that means us, the Association and everyone in the area, also playing a part. We know what needs doing outside our own homes or elsewhere in our own road and if lots of people work with the association to produce an overall survey of what's needed, we can use it as the basis of a programme to be negotiated with the

council. And with your help we can also monitor what's done and keep them on their toes as well. Most local councillors would welcome this as would the majority of their staff, but firm action against staff or contractors who don't do their job, and enforcement action against residents, individual property owners or landlords who are failing to look after their bit of the environment, needs to be part of the package.

There should be a big push in February or March when new black bins are introduced for those that want them; CCRA will want to look at other measures at that time to get the streets cleaner; another campaign and some enforcement action against dogs mess, some good quality litter bins or whatever you tell us is needed in your road.

In some parts of the country an intensive deep clean up of a group of streets is organised over a summer weekend, with the council and local community working together. On Saturday cars in one half are moved and the streets are closed so that gutters, gullies and drains are weeded, emptied, steam cleaned, whatever is needed. On Sunday the other half is done. At the same time skips and other specialist containers are put in the area allowing you to get rid of wood, metal, mattresses, waste oil, broken furniture etc which doesn't fit into the standard bins. Providing it's planned and publicised, local people of all ages can work alongside council staff and give a hand to neighbours who have difficulty moving such items themselves.

It all sounds very fine but can it be done. Well, not everything will get sorted that way but with some local energy and enthusiasm, and some fine weather, a lot could be achieved in a weekend. I think we should say we're up for it. We could also organise a street party each night before the vehicles come back. Both a clean and friendly neighbourhood at the same time! Let me know what you think.

# Wheelie Bin Update

Since the last edition of Grapevine, we have met with the Assistant Director of Neighbourhood Services for

the Council, Ray Collingham, who is ultimately the person responsible for issues to do with the cleanliness and up keep of our neighbourhood. We had a genuinely positive meeting with Ray and we explained in detail many of our concerns. These included the problem of black sack storage, issues posed by properties with multiple households, worries about enforcement, and more clarity about what goes in which bin/ black sack. We are aware that if we hadn't had one of the gloomiest summers on record, things might have been a lot worse.

We are pleased that many

of the reassurances Ray gave us at our meeting are now translating into some real improvements. These include, a further leaflet about what to put where and notices being issues for wrongly filled bins offering the chance to have these collected again without any further consequence or penalty. Most particularly, the Council has now addressed people's long standing

concerns about black sacks. By now, residents should have received a letter from Peter Dalley, Head of Waste Services, offering every household a free, new, black wheelie bin in addition to the green and blue bins they already have. We will also have the chance to order a small green bin if we want one, though the blue bin will remain a single (large) size for all. Unfortunately we will have to wait until next March for this to happen. This

is because there is apparently a Europe-wide shortage of wheelie bins with so many local Councils everywhere aiming to recycle far more of their domestic waste!

The Council has promised us that it will continue to respond individually to any specific concerns we raise with them, such as storage of food waste, collection cycles and further clarity about what to put where. So, if you have any problems or issues to do with the service we do, really still want to hear from you. CCRA's contact is Dave Picton on 020 8858 4942. In the meantime we would urge everyone to return their "Wheelie bin requirements" form to the Council as soon as possible, even if no changes are required. If you haven't received a form through the post by now please contact the Council so you can take up their offer next year.



# **Eltham Community Hospital**

The CCRA attended the recent public consultation launched by Greenwich PCT to hear about the sort of services that might be provided at a new community hospital in Passey Place. The hospital will provide up to 40 intermediate care beds (for short term care to enable people to return home and to make plans for their long term care). This is good news for people who do not need to stay in hospital but need more time and assistance before going home. (Remember Eltham Cottage Hospital?).

Proposed services also include: a GP surgery open every day from 8am to 8pm, an urgent care centre for treating minor injuries and illnesses, blood test

and x-rays, antenatal and post-natal care and some treatments and therapies such as sports injuries, pain management and foot health care.

The proposal will primarily affect people using GP services in Eltham but you may be interested in following this development – is this the first polyclinic in the Borough and will it bring improvements for us? We were unclear how the service would be managed, who would be in control and whether some services could be contracted out. The consultation ends on 20 October so if you would like to receive further information you can email info.eltham@greenwichpct. nhs.uk or telephone, free, 0800 6783179.

### SERVICES FOR PARENTS AND YOUNG CHILDREN

#### "What is a children's centre?"

Our neighbourhood is well served by Sure Start Children's Centres. They are great places to go and meet other mums and have fun with your baby. They run sessions such as Bouncing Babies and Baby Bag Play Sessions with the Speech and Language Therapists; Dental Health and Weaning Workshops (where a resident reports that her baby was given a drinking cup and toothbrush) and Baby Massage and Post Natal Group where discussion includes such things as first aid and safety.

Sure Start is the government department which aims to make childcare more available for all children whose parents wish it. It also seeks to improve children's health and emotional well-being and to support parents both in their role as parents and in seeking opportunities for work or training.

Children's Centres have been set up around the country to provide or signpost good quality year-round early care and education. To support this there is teacher input into all the centres and access to a wide range of child and family health services, including antenatal services. The aim is that over time these centres should become a one-stop shop for families with young children. Services available may include family support services; support for children and parents with special needs, a childminder network, and effective links with Jobcentre Plus to support parents/carers wishing to get back into training or employment.

Every local authority is required to provide a Children's Information Service. You can contact Greenwich's service on 020 8921 6921 or by email at cis@greenwich.gov.uk. ### A Picture of Health - Final Decision Made?

On 21 July the Joint Committee of Primary Care Trusts agreed to proceed with plans to reorganise the National Health hospital services in Bexley, Bromley, Greenwich and Lewisham. For our local hospital, Queen Elizabeth, this will mean that the accident and emergency department will expand and the hospital will continue to receive medical, surgical and paediatric emergencies. There will be no planned, routine inpatient surgery. This will be undertaken at Queen Mary's Hospital and at specialist units in other London hospitals.

On 10 September, the Joint Health Overview and Scrutiny Committee voted to refer the proposed programme to the Secretary of State for Health. Bexley Council has made particular representations about the changes proposed at Queen Mary's. This means that there will be a delay in implementing the preferred plans whilst the Secretary of State takes further advice on how safe and sustainable the proposed services would be and whether these will be in the long term best interests of the local population.

# I heard it on the grapevine...

### **New Rector at St Lukes**

CCRA welcomes Erica Woolf, the new rector of St. Lukes. Erica will be rector of one of the oldest churches in this part of London. St Luke's was built in 1630 but there has been a church on the site since the 11th century. It has an illustrious history: - Spencer Percival, the only British Prime Minister to have been assassinated whilst in office is buried there. Percival was Prime Minister from 1809 to 1812. He had instituted Orders in Council in 1807 against trade with France and became unpopular in the winter of 1811 with Luddite riots breaking out. He was forced to concede an inquiry by the House of Commons and was on his way to attend it when he was shot through the heart by John Bellingham. The latter was said to have been mentally unstable and had blamed his financial instability on Percival. He was hanged a week later. Perceval's body lay in 10 Downing Street for five days before his burial at St Luke's Church.
