Unveiled - revised plans for the Squirrel site

The latest plans for the Squirrel site development off Victoria Way were under scrutiny recently at Charlton House.

Residents had the opportunity to see Fairview New Homes Limited's version of the site following Galliard Homes' withdrawal from the scheme.

While the building is peripheral to CCRA, especially as access will be from Gurdon Road, there will inevitably be some disruption as we understand lorry egress is to be via Victoria Way.

Developers say the original plan to provide 209 homes remains unchanged. But the new scheme will introduce 20 family houses, to be built on the northern boundary, whose back gardens would adjoin the existing gardens of houses in Gurdon Road, thus matching the existing street pattern of the area. The original plan to provide parking spaces for 160 vehicles also remains unchanged.

The proposal is expected to go before the council next month, after which LBG will consult local residents again and it will be put to the vote in spring 2012. If agreed, work would begin next August and would take between 12 and 18 months.

Retail therapy ...or traffic hell?

he big supermarkets are playing musical chairs in Charlton, leaving those of us in need of retail therapy perplexed. Within the past few weeks Sainsbury's, Asda, Tesco, Marks and Spencer and Lidl have all expressed interest in sites around Bugsby's Way.

And, as the stores jostle for their new positions, we hear that Matalan are bidding for Sainsbury's old site. What or who will take over Matalan's old site is unknown. While good for shopping, however, the new proposals could add to traffic problems at the bottom of Charlton Church Lane and across the main Woolwich Road.

It seems likely that Sainsbury's plan for an express branch on the site beneath the new flats opposite Charlton station must be compromised and rumours suggest this will revert to plan A to become three small shops.

LXB Retail Properties plc are seeking to develop swathes of land on the other side of Woolwich Road. And the company has confirmed the story reported in the last edition of Grapevine, that Sainsbury's plan to relocate to the Wickes site, though the existing Greenwich peninsula store will continue to trade until the new one is built. Marks and Spencer fans will be delighted to hear that they



Work may soon begin at 42-44 Wellington Gardens after planning permission was granted at a council meeting on 16 November. CCRA has made a significant contribution to conditions imposed on the developer – more details in forthcoming CCRA publications. Thanks to members who attended the meeting. The dreadful drains in Wellington Gardens remain a concern – as things stand the developer just has to be in contact with Thames Water. But CCRA is not giving up. In our favour is the suggestion that the developer should have regular site meetings with CCRA representatives – so watch this space!



are also interested in opening a store on the same site. Between Asda and the Fire Station, LXB is set to build a Travelodge with 120 bedrooms, though it looks unlikely to be ready in time for the Olympics – which must have been a target date. Currently LXB hopes to present a planning application early in 2012.

But traffic is already a big problem on Woolwich Road and from central Charlton, drivers are likely to be held up at the junction of Victoria Way and Woolwich Road. The presence of a hotel and possible construction traffic using that junction for new homes currently planned at the Squirrel Storage site (see p8) can only make that worse.

On page 2 of July"s Grapevine we ran a short tongue-in-cheek piece on the death of Sir Spencer Perceval, the only British Prime Minister to have been assassinated, who is buried at Charlton Parish Church. The aim of the article was to gauge interest in a darts team or get a game going. We've had a number of enquiries but not enough to organise a match yet. However one resident, with suspiciously pro-Millwall sympathies, has replied to our article with equally disputable facts. Read on...

I'm surprised you fell for that old chestnut blaming Millwall supporters for Spencer Percival's death. They were marshalled in and out of the ground and not allowed anywhere near a Charlton pub. But some of the story is correct. Pozzer was a Charlton fan and was planning a coup against the club's management, trying to impose a French manager Arsene Bonaparte. MI6 uncovered the plot and persuaded Mad King George he was the next target, so he sanctioned the use of a poisoned dart. The danger was averted and we triumphed at Waterloo a few years later. It was all hushed up of course by making scapegoats of the Millwall fans and that is how it has remained to the present day. They don't care!

The road to ruin

otholes can, quite literally, be a pain in the backside. But if you are unlucky enough to come across them as you drive around streets of Charlton there is something you can do about it.

If you spot a bad pothole on a road or pavement, note its exact location – the street name and nearest house number or the number of the nearest lamp standard - and tell the local authority. Greenwich council has a form for this on its website. A council must deal with it and Greenwich has pledged to inspect the problem within two days of receiving your report. It aims to repair roads and pavements within 15 working days and to deal with emergencies within 24 hours.

If possible take a photograph of both the pothole and any damage to your car. If the cost is more than £500 you might need council permission before a repair goes ahead. Check wheels and tyres after any incident. Keep any relevant paperwork relating to either repairs or personal injury.

Olympics home rentals and how to avoid the high jump Simon Hughes, of Conran Estates in Charlton, offers

some sound advice for those thinking of renting their homes out during the Olympics

f only I had a pound for every time someone discussed with me about renting their property during the Olympics and making lots of cash! While this could be a great idea, I would seriously recommend you know the pitfalls before taking the plunge.

We have an Olympic offering, for those who are interested, but it is a transparent service where clients are fully aware of the risks. Here's a summary:

- Is your buildings insurance still valid if you rent on a short term basis? If not then look into obtaining other cover for the period or making a change with your existing insurer.
- Does your mortgage lender allow the property to be rented on this type of tenancy (even as a Buy-to-Let mortgage, many lenders will not permit this type of activity)?
- Holiday tenants are treated very differently from normal long term tenants and therefore the due diligence process is very basic, if at all. You will have to trust a total stranger to look after your home!
- Deposits are small in comparison to a longer let and therefore if a holiday-maker broke a big-ticket item, your 'profit-vs-hassle' could make it a bad investment.
- Criminal damage: if tenants deliberately broke or stole belongings then what recourse would you have? Litigation is an option but how would you take an overseas visitor to court? If you did, how much of your time

and further cash would this process take?

- ✓ If you already have a buy-to-let property you wish to rent during the Olympics then please be very careful, as you will need vacant possession. For this to be certain you may need the existing tenants out many months before your visitors arrive. If your tenants have not moved out then where does this leave you in legal terms with the new arrivals not being able to move into your property? Please note, removing an unwilling tenant can take many months through the County Court.
- ✓ Furthermore, what if there is a saturated lettings market following the Olympics? Your property may have a further void period that could make this process unprofitable. As a landlord, assuming you have good tenants, then my recommendation is to keep them in your property.
- Fraud (this is one for the tourists). Undoubtedly there will be properties on the market that are not really available. Anyone can take a photo of a house and place it on a holiday website for short term, fraudulent gain. You pay your entire rental money along with the deposit directly to this fraudster and when you get to London, the property is not there or not available and you have been done. Please be cautious and rent a property through a reputable agent or source. We ensure that we prove both ownership and identity from our landlords to ensure peace of mind for incoming tenants.

It's a load of old rubbish

ave you walked down Wellington Mews recently? If so, you will probably think you have strayed into Greenwich's municipal tip. Fly tippers have been illegally dumping waste there for some time and it is littered with abandoned cars and huge piles of assorted rubbish and sawn up trees.

The Mews is a private, unmade-up road, and as such, in the first instance, it is the responsibility of the



occupier or owner of the land to remove the waste.

But the Council can step in and serve enforcement orders to have the land cleared if it is deemed to be detrimental to the area. Greenwich Council has recently called time on the culprits and started proceedings to prosecute one fly tipper.

You might wonder how to get rid of bulky items such as a sofa or a fridge. The answer is to call the Council's Waste Services team on 020 8921 4661 for details of

And did you know that you can be prosecuted if your waste is dumped illegally, even if someone else dumped it for you?

If you decide to ask someone else to dispose of your waste you should:

- 1. Ask if the person collecting your rubbish is registered as a waste carrier with the Environment Agency.
- 2. Ask where your waste is being taken: the site should be licensed by the Environment Agency.
- 3. Ask for a signed receipt with their carrier registration number on it and if possible get the vehicle registration number.
- 4. If you have any concerns, don't hand over your waste. If it is dumped illegally you could be prosecuted.

To check whether a person or a site is licensed or for advice on disposal of waste you can use the new online public register at www.environment-agency.gov. uk/publicregisters, or call the Environment Agency on 08708 506 506.

Anyone who witnesses fly-tipping or has evidence about the origin of fly-tipped waste should call the Contact Centre on 020 8921 4661. Fly tips on public highway or council owned land will usually be cleared within 24 hours.

An Oasis in Charlton?

The Greening Group has been discussing an exciting new idea - a community garden in the empty land opposite the allotment site on Highcombe. An urban oasis, tucked in among the houses, would be of particular benefit to people living in flats. And the land would allow us to work with local schools to support young children to learn about growing and enjoying fresh produce. There are issues to resolve: first, who owns the land and would they be willing to sign a peppercorn-rent lease? Second, how would we keep the patch secure? And finally, how do we manage a community garden?

Cookery corner

With Christmas on the horizon, we'll soon be raiding the larder for gifts. Instead of boring old chocolates how about warming up a winter evening by making this delicious fruit paste from one of the most neglected of autumn's fruits?

Quince cheese or (membrillo in Spain)*

1kg preserving sugar 750ml water

1.2kg quince, peeled, cored and grated or cut into small pieces
Dissolve the sugar in the water and bring to the boil. Continue to boil

for about 5 minutes to make a light syrup. Stir the quince into the syrup, bring back to the boil and simmer very gently, stirring every so often for anything from 45 minutes to 1.5 hours until the mixture turns to a thick grainy paste. This certainly demands

patience, but I find an occasional whisk helps the process along. It is ready when the spoon, dragged across the bottom of the pan, separates the paste, showing the clean bottom of the pan.

Spread the paste into lightly greased shallow dishes or trays and place in the oven at its lowest possible temperature for 3-4 hours to harden further. Remove from the oven and leave to cool.

Once cool, wrap in greaseproof paper in useable slabs that you can give away as gifts or keep for your own

use. Store these in the fridge in sealed containers. It will keep for up to a year.

You can also cut it into little sweets and wrap them individually.


