Questions remain unanswered as IKEA reveals store design

On 18 January CCRA joined representatives of The Charlton Society, Westcombe Society, Greenwich Society, Blackheath Society, Greenwich Environment Forum and the Enderby Group for a presentation from planners, architects and other IKEA representatives. The meeting was to showcase the design for the new store due to open on the old Sainsbury's site in Summer 2018. The design has some new innovative features (roof pavilion, wood constructions etc.) that go beyond the standard IKEA 'blue box'. While welcoming the opportunity to engage positively with IKEA about the store many questions remained unanswered about the store's impact on traffic and associated issues regarding poor air quality. Watch this space for further updates.

Let's Hope it works!

The Anchor and Hope development planning application no. 16/4008/F appeared on Greenwich Council's website on 11 January. With more than 270 documents it's a tough read but an important one as it will have a significant impact on our area. The official 21 days for consultation ended on 1 February but the borough has indicated it will accept comments after that date, although sooner rather than later. Our CCRA planning sleuths have examined the small print:


he scheme proposes nine buildings with 975 residential units, plus other space for mixed use including retail, restaurant, community and leisure. The build period is five years: 2018-2023. The development would be on two plots and is predominantly for high rise, 'stepped' buildings. Only two buildings overall would have six storeys or less. Others would have up to 16 storeys; and a 'landmark building' just to the east of the junction with Bugsby's Way would have 28 storeys. Existing vehicle access from Anchor & Hope Lane would be altered and new pedestrian access, open space and landscaping provided. A maximum of 15% affordable housing is being proposed, as it is claimed that Greenwich's target of 35% would reduce profit on sale to 1.95%, whereas the developer's profit target is 18%.

Much of the impact on those closest to the proposed development is being played down on the grounds that there are only two small residential enclaves along Anchor & Hope Lane. Similarly, the impact on the rest of Charlton is being minimised. Provision of a river pier is not certain. Despite increased passenger number forecasts for Charlton station, it is claimed that there will be no significant impact on the existing rail capacity and that Crossrail will mitigate

the cumulative impact of increased need.

The real impact on education and healthcare provision is not covered. The development is geared towards families, but although a 76-place nursery is planned, there is no primary or secondary school provision and the nearest school mentioned is at Fossdene Road. Although 'a healthcare facility' is mentioned, documents seen so far refer only to a dentist. The nearest GP is quoted as being at the Fairfield practice off Charlton Village.

Other proposed facilities on the site include a swimming pool and gym for site residents, but all occupants will rely on Charlton south of Woolwich Road for rail links, most educational facilities and healthcare. Education and health care facilities might be improved 'later' in Riverside's development, but no one can predict with certainty. It is hoped that public pressure will ensure that RBG looks very closely at the application and insists on better information for, and consideration of local residents. 12 sided £1 coin

The new 12-sided one pound coin that comes into circulation on 28 March 2017 is being mentioned in the press but relatively few people are aware of it and some local residents may be rather confused about the situation. The current £1 coin is being replaced because it is vulnerable to counterfeiters and the Royal Mint says that around one in 30 £1 coins in circulation is a counterfeit. The new coin is thinner and lighter but slightly wider than the old one. Both the new 12-sided coin and the old round one can be used until 15 October 2017, but after that there is no obligation on shops etc to accept the old round coin and they should be deposited in one's account at a bank or post office. 'Bulging bags of bunnies,

bootees, bears and blankets!'

ne chilly day in December, members of CCRA's Knit and Natter group were given a warm reception by nursing staff when they arrived at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Woolwich. The knitters emptied bulging bags, piling up great heaps of bespoke bunnies, bears, blankets and bootees on a table in the Neonatal Unit, bearing witness to their dedicated hard work.

Teri Stimson, Nurse Manager and neonatal sister at the hospital, was enthusiastic about the knitted contributions. 'Snuggle bunnies', which are popular with mums, are a valuable way to encourage bonding, she said. The mother keeps one on her body, where the wool absorbs her smell and baby has the other. These are swapped over, which helps to settle the baby, while aiding lactation in its mother. Bootees and hats are good for little cold feet and heads, though unnecessary for babies in incubators.

Teri added: 'Mittens are particularly useful when the babies have cannulas in their arms for antibiotics, so they can be covered up and they're not hitting their face with the tubing.'

Blankets are always useful, too, and add a welcome bit of colour but crochet blankets – while lovely - are unsuitable for the babies, whose fingers get caught in them, she said

Teri said: 'We very much appreciate all the things





the knitters bring in as do the parents of the babies we care for. They make the items to the sizes we need and nothing is too much trouble for them.

'We like to give the babies a little gift at Christmas so we fill stockings or make up little bags with the teddies and probably with a blanket this year because we've got a nice supply.

'I'd like to say a huge thank you to the ladies for their time and for thinking of us and being so kind.'

Brenda Taggart, CCRA chair and founder of the group, said they had been knitting together for about two years and everyone loved making things for the babies. She said: 'It gives our hobby a real purpose.' Group members meet for a couple of hours once a month and take what they have worked on in between sessions.

She said: 'We share tips, share patterns and problem solve with Philippa, who is our best knitter. It's a real team effort and we all feel we're doing something really worthwhile.'

Brenda paid tribute to the group's sponsors, the yarn company Rowan, and said: 'They donate a lot of the wool we use and have provided us with some wonderful high quality wool – alpaca merino. All our snuggle bunnies are made with pure alpaca, and all the beautiful alpaca and merino wool bootees, hats and teddies are made from the wool they supply. It's important that anything that touches the baby's skin is super-soft and without Rowan's help we'd really be struggling to maintain this high quality. This is really expensive wool and they've been enormously generous in providing what we wanted.'

A very special Old Cottage Café Christmas, thanks to Michael and Mim

ichael and Mim of the Old Cottage Café in Charlton Park invited 16 elderly people living in local sheltered housing to have Christmas Day dinner at the café.

Asda, Macro and Charlton residents donated food and drinks for a Christmas dinner with all the trimmings. Supported by a group of volunteers – including some CCRA members – Michael and Mim served a very tasty Christmas dinner. A few extra portions were delivered to residents in sheltered accommodation who weren't mobile enough to join the party.

Everyone involved had a great time and especially the Christmas crackers as well as the raffle when prizes were won and swopped, causing a lot of laughter. New connections were made, phone numbers exchanged and further meetings at the café arranged. Michael said: 'It went well!' And Mim said: 'I was touched by how many people offered to

help.' Thank you from everyone, Michael and Mim, for a lovely afternoon and for bringing the community together.

This type of crime is rare and random and therefore difficult to solve. If anyone has any information about these incidents please call the police on 101. If you see anyone acting suspiciously or witness any anti-social behaviour please try to get a good description of the perpetrators and let the police know as soon as you can.

CCTV footage can be particularly helpful and local intelligence can be especially useful to the police when they are trying to apprehend these criminals.

Arrangements are underway for the next Air Quality survey of the CCRA area. Twenty special tubes were being erected around the neighbourhood at



the end of January and they will remain in situ for a month.

This is to monitor the nitrogen dioxide in the air for those sites. The results, when gathered, will be a snapshot for that month and can be dependent upon weather and other conditions.

But it will enable us to compare measurements taken over the past couple of years. We'll be reporting on this and other air quality related issues in the next edition of Grapevine.
