# **Happy 10th Birthday to CCRA!**

t started with a fire in Wellington Gardens – serious enough to lead neighbours to call on friends and acquaintances and start to discuss how to make our area safer and friendlier. A small group of people met informally for several months to plan what could be done. Early in 2007, in two well-attended meetings at St Richard's Hall, people gathered in groups according to the street where they lived, talking and getting to know one another. Their suggestions led to a meeting at Fossdene School, attended by councillors and Nick Raynsford, then our MP, where people were invited to stand for the management committee. CCRA has never looked back.

Colin Brown, then living in Wellington Gardens, was elected as the first CCRA chair at the opening committee meeting. Our first members' bulletin was circulated in November 2007. It listed the fourteen most pressing concerns identified at those early meetings and actions to be taken, regarding: improvements to the environment; monitoring planning developments; community safety (then called law and order). The bulletin outlined a programme of social activities with a newsletter and website to improve communications and considered revenue streams to support the Association, including fund raising and advertising in the newsletter.

The first newsletter, Grapevine, was distributed to homes in all the streets included in the CCRA area in January 2008. Its lead story was about Thames Water and it was a single sheet of A3, 800 copies of which were painstakingly copied on a low grade photocopier by two committee members.

There have since been many planning meetings and discussions. We have established community day, through which CCRA works with the council to improve the quality of our environment while our community safety and Neighbourhood Watch group

works closely with the police to alert residents to burglaries and other crime in the neighbourhood. We have a full programme of social events and have helped local interest groups to get established – including the Charlton Community Gardens group. The band, SE7, plays regularly at Cattleya and all CCRA events and the singers take every opportunity to sing to anyone who'll listen. In addition to bulletins, newsletters and a website we now have social media accounts

Nick Raynsford sent us a message, saying: ""I can hardly believe that 10 years have passed since the CCRA was formed, and I congratulate everyone involved in what you have achieved over those 10 years.

"The need for an effective local voice promoting the interests of the community is stronger than ever, and in the years to come, with so many potential opportunities and challenges facing you in Charlton, your Association will continue to have a vitally important role to play. I wish you a happy 10th anniversary celebration and every success in the future."

If you were one of those who attended our inaugural meetings back in 2007 we'd love to hear from you. If you're new to the area or the organisation come to our birthday weekend events and play your part in making Charlton Central a safer, friendlier place.

RBG has now concluded negotiations with the new firm commissioned to build the Charlton Park Skatepark. Work is due to start in October for an opening early in 2018.

Everyone in the CCRA area can attend the AGM and the rest of the evening but only paid up full members can vote, make nominations or submit resolutions. Those attending may join the Association on the night. Associate members are not eligible to vote.

### Down by the Riverside - and more

Previous Grapevines have highlighted plans to develop Charlton Riverside. Following years of consultations, public meetings, letter writing and debate we finally have an agreed plan. On 21 June 2017 the Royal Borough of Greenwich's (RBG) Cabinet adopted the updated Charlton Riverside Masterplan Supplementary Planning Document. Associated with this are two commissioned research studies: The Charlton Riverside Employment and Heritage Study and the Woolwich Road: Light public and highways improvements. The Masterplan details plans for a mixed-use urban quarter and provides clear planning guidance for sustainable regeneration in line with RBG's Core Strategy. Planned are 5,000-7,000 new homes (35% affordable), in low to medium rise (3-6 storeys) rising to 10 storeys. The proposed district centre at Anchor and Hope Lane will create a new High Street, with shops, offices, and health and community facilities. #### Have your say on transport links

Despite a massive increase in population along the Woolwich Road due to housing developments, TFL are consulting on a new bus scheme that will see a DECREASE in service for those of us who travel to Greenwich/Lewisham by the 180. The current plan is to terminate this service at North Greenwich. TfL are consulting on this proposal and alterations to other services around Woolwich. You can object to this scheme by completing the TfL consultation at https://consultations.tfl.gov.uk/buses/elizabeth-line until 17 September. Have your say and point out to TfL that with an increase in population we need more transport infrastructure, not less.



# Such a fruitful community

Charlton Community Gardens started in 2011 with a £50 grant from CCRA. Using this seed money we held open meetings and attracted local people who were keen to create a community garden. One of those recruits wrote the bid to the RHS that secured the £1880 used to establish the garden at Charlton Station. We hope to involve Charlton Park Academy in extending the garden on the station.

More recently we have successfully obtained funding from Greggs Foundation to establish a community orchard in Charlton Park—but more about this next scheme when we see you at the AGM on 5 October.

It's not all been plain sailing. The most dispiriting thing is the vandalism that has destroyed plants and interrupted our water supply on the station. But we know that with the helpful interventions of our neighbours, this sort of thing can be stopped. Please contact us through the website www.charltoncommunitygardens.org.uk if you have any concerns.

Do help yourself to herbs and produce - as we say to the children who love the soft fruit - leaving some for someone else. Enjoy the bounty and make changes in your own garden to grow what you eat. Gardening is part of community life in Charlton. And CCG always welcomes new volunteers.

### **Playing out**

This fortnightly session contributes to making the neighbourhood safer and friendlier. The section of Sundorne Road between Priolo Road and Swallowfield Road is closed to traffic so that children can play safely. Sessions begin after school - around 3.45 and usually go on until 5.00 or 5.30 when children are tired and hungry. A minimum of four stewards are needed for every session so we're always looking for volunteers. If you can spare a bit of time - occasionally or regularly - contact Liz on playingoutse7@gmail.com. The next session is Wednesday 6 September – and on alternate Wednesdays after that.

### **Community interest groups**

#### **Singing Group**

The singing group was formed in 2008 and is open to anyone in the CCRA area. There is no audition process, and no need to read music. We meet fortnightly, but it is not necessary for everyone to attend every session as the focus is on singing for enjoyment rather than rehearsing for performance. The repertoire is largely chosen by members of the group and has included popular songs, folk songs, madrigals, rounds and songs from different cultural traditions.

We have given a few public performances, mainly at CCRA socials but also at other local events.

One of our regular activities is to go carol singing in December around our neighbourhood, raising money for local charities. Since 2012 we have raised over £2000 for organisations including Blind Independence Greenwich, Greenwich Carers Centre, Greenwich Foodbank, Charlton Toy Library and Greenwich Dementia Carers.

#### **Instrumental Music Group**

The band is open to anyone in the area who plays any instrument at any level. We hold regular sessions on alternate Mondays. Reading music is not essential. Repertoire is chosen by group members, and has included jazz standards, folk music and music from many different cultural traditions.

We give occasional public performances, under the name 'SE7'. These include playing at CCRA events and our regular Sunday evenings at Cattleya, in Charlton Church Lane. These performances are open to any members of the group who feel confident to join in either for the whole session or for particular pieces. We have also played at the Horn Fair, St Luke's Church summer concert, and ceilidhs for CCRA and others.

#### **Walking Group**

In June we took the ferry to North Woolwich, past the former North Woolwich Railway Station and the Tate & Lyle refinery. Silvertown was an important Victorian industrial area, tragically remembered for a massive explosion of 50 tons of TNT at a munitions factory in 1917. We continued past the new home of Brick Lane Music Hall and City Airport, to the beautiful Barrier gardens. After a very pleasant break at the cafe, we continued past the massive Millennium Mills, crossed the Royal Victoria Dock and past the Excel Centre to then enjoy the views from the cable car as it took us back to Greenwich.

Our July walk was a section of the Green Chain Walk we had not previously attempted. Starting at Bostall Woods we walked through to Plumstead Cemetery and on to East Wickham Open Space (a huge grassy area off Shooters Hill with a wide range of bird, butterfly and flower species).

We meet at Charlton Station at 10am for our walks and welcome newcomers; our pace is not fast and we always end the walk where we can get refreshments. ### **Community Day**

Our first community day was held in July 2009, when over 50 people turned out to help clean up our streets. This year there were fewer volunteers but no less efficient and enthusiastic. Next year's community day will probably be the first Saturday in July – put that in your diary so you can come and help clear up unsightly rubbish.

We also try to improve some of our green spaces – a theme we will highlight throughout this year. Come to the AGM on 5 October to hear our plans and make suggestions for spending the new council grant. This year we had a freecycle allowing residents to offload stuff they no longer needed and pick up a bargain. Remaining items went to The Mental Health Activity Trust, a local charity. CCRA paid-up members could also have bulky items such as old sofas and fridges removed without charge by the council – a big saving. Please try to help us keep our streets clean. Don't leave rubbish in your garden or on the street, to attract vermin and create potential health hazards. People are less likely to dump rubbish in well-maintained, clean environments.


### **Charlton Neighbourhood Watch news**

fter the horrific attacks in Manchester and London we are sharing security advice from the National Police Chiefs' Council. If caught up in a terrorist attack their advice is to: RUN, HIDE, TELL. RUN to a place of safety. This is a far better option than to surrender or negotiate. If there's nowhere to go, then... HIDE It's better to hide than to confront. Remember to turn your phone to silent and turn off vibrate. Barricade yourself in if you can. Finally and only when it is safe to do so... TELL the police by calling 999

Watch the police's Stay Safe film at www.npcc. police.uk/staysafe. Information is vital in combating terrorism. If you see or hear something that could be terrorist related, trust your instincts and call the confidential Anti-Terrorist hotline on 0800 789 321. Specially trained officers will take it from there. Your call could save lives. In an emergency always call 999.
