Starting in July the group, organised and led by local expert Chew-Yeen Laws, has grown each week and more than 40 people are regularly taking part.


Elliscombe Road resident, Barbara Smith, attends whenever possible.

# He stood in the doorway of the florist's shop...

Trevor Francis Gunning sadly died on 27 July this year after a long illness. Trevor was born in Plumstead in 1927. He began work as an apprentice instrument-maker at Siemens (later taken over by Associated Electrical Industries) at 14. Trevor later worked at Imperial College as a technician in the field of applied technologies.

He married his wife Doreen in 1950 and they moved to their current home in Nadine Street in 1954. For 30 years Doreen ran a florist's shop in Charlton Church Lane – widely remembered for its mynah bird. After retirement, Trevor was often referred to, his daughter reports, as 'the man who stands in the doorway of the shop'. On one occasion, charged with managing the shop, Trevor could not be found – until spotted asleep on the stock of hay under the counter!

But he wasn't always asleep – he singlehandedly repointed the back of their five-storey house and was throughout his life a keen sportsman and a stalwart at AEI's Meridian Sports Club. He maintained his sporting interests and continued to play darts and short-mat bowling until ill-health intervened. Fruit machines and bingo were a weakness of his!

Despite ill-health Trevor's determination often won through. Placed in respite care so Doreen could take a muchneeded holiday, Trevor was far from happy with his surroundings. Escaping from his room he set off the fire alarms. For this he was expelled from the care home and allowed to return home – where his daughter travelled from Gloucester to care for him.

Trevor is survived by Doreen, his children, grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.



### **Greenwich unlocked**

September brings major opportunities to get out more and enjoy some entertainment. The Greenwich Comedy Festival will be held at the National Maritime Museum from 15 to 19 September. Details and tickets available on www.greenwichcomedyfestival.co.uk.

Tickets are on sale now for the new venue Woolwich Works – a new creative hub funded by Greenwich Council to the tune of  $\mathfrak L31$  million. It is housed in the Royal Arsenal in buildings formerly used by the borough archive and the Firepower museum.

The investment is not without controversy, but the chief executive, James Heaton, has promised that the planned

programme will "smash everybody's expectations".

Plans for this year include the Chineke Orchestra, committed to providing career opportunities for black and ethnically diverse classical musicians; the National Youth Jazz Orchestra; Punchdrunk, claimed by *GQ* magazine to be the world's leading immersive theatre group; Forward Prize-winning poet Malika Booker; and Woolwich based dance group Protein as well as the Woolwich Contemporary Print Fair.

### Still more towers

Still they come. Since our last edition, Tower Hamlets planning board have agreed four more towers at Blackwall Flat, across the river from the O2, over 30 storeys high.

Nearer home, plans have now gone a stage further to demolish B&Q and to build on that site and the huge parking space in front of both B&Q and IKEA, right up to the edge of the motorway. Two blocks of 20 and one of 17 are included.

And In Woolwich the new leisure centre, replacing the Waterfront, which will be built between the Arsenal station and the Tramshed, will have, to its rear, several more towers going up to 22 storeys.

Only Charlton riverside will be left holding out against the skyscrapers. The Masterplan for the area, whose core principles are still upheld by a majority of the council's planning board, including the two Conservative members, is the core planning reason we are not looking at skyscrapers on our doorstep.

Developers would love to see it go but Charlton Together will vigorously resist such a move and continue to campaign for a low/medium-rise community friendly Riverside.

At the end of July, two planning applications for sites between Westmoor Street and Eastmoor Street, which run down to the Thames Barrier, were refused permission against planning officers' recommendations.

They were on adjacent sites where three or four storeys was the guidance suggested by the Masterplan, and both were rejected as too high and too dense.

The smaller, from a housing association called Optivo, was seven storeys high but with 100% affordable flats to rent. It was criticised, but not opposed, by Charlton Together.

The bigger one from the Aitch Group, which was nine storeys high with only 30% affordable, was vigorously opposed.

What will happen next on the Charlton Riverside is difficult to predict. Aitch and Optivo may appeal against the refusal of planning permission. U+I are pushing forward with their revised plans for the old Siemens site, including the Grade II listed building facing out to Barrier Park (21/2455/L and 19/4304/F

on the council's planning website.) They are offering 4% of affordable housing!! Others may also go ahead, or they might wait to see how possible appeals are treated.

In the background, the government has to decide how to take forward their White Paper proposals to make major changes in planning law, that would hugely reduce the role of local people and local councils in controlling what happens in their area.

They are strongly opposed by some of their own MP's, some calling it a developers' charter, and judged to be a key reason for the Conservatives' defeat in the recent Chesham and Amersham by-election. That national decision may well impact on the Charlton riverside situation at some point.

In our view, we should not give up on the aim of creating a vibrant human scale community on the banks of our section of the Thames in Greenwich.

We also want that to help large numbers of local people desperately needing decent homes, who would be financially squeezed out by the mostly non-affordable high rise flats the developers find so profitable.

## Pay up for cleaner air

In our March edition we reported on the introduction of the Ultra-Low Emission Zone (ULEZ), which will result in charges of £12.50 a day for many older cars.

Charging starts on 25 October and will operate every day of the year (except Christmas Day).

It's likely that if your vehicle does not meet the required standards

you will already have received a letter from Transport for London (TfL) – but if in doubt you can check by going to tfl.gov.uk/ulez-2021.

We know that air

pollution can cause serious ill-health or even death and TfL claim that in areas already subject to ULEZ, levels of Nitrogen Dioxide fell by nearly half in the first year of operation.



### Apocalypse now – nowhere is safe

The whole world is still struggling with Covid, but is facing an even greater threat from climate change. We are witnessing the worst ever wildfires in many countries around the globe and cities thousands of miles away poisoned by the fumes.

There are unprecedented floods from China to Germany. Drought, less dramatic or newsy, but just as destructive, is already devastating whole communities in some parts of the world. If we weren't worried about climate change before this year, evidence of its lethal effect on the planet is now all around us.

In Glasgow this November, thousands of delegates from most governments and countries in the world, will participate in a two-week United Nations (UN) conference, COP26, arguably the most important event of 2021.

It is fulfilling promises at the Paris Conference in 2015. which sought action plans from all governments around the world to curb emissions in order to limit temperature-rise above pre-industrial figures, as closely as possible to 1.5C.

Our Member of Parliament, Matt Pennycook, as the shadow minister for climate change, has been very busy recently preparing for that vital conference, which means mastering the complex scientific, economic and social implications of targeting zero emissions, and the even more tortuous political problem of getting international agreement to make

the necessary changes extremely quickly.

In a recent Parliamentary debate, as reported in *Hansard* (22 July 2021 and well worth a read), he said: "There is clearly not yet a global consensus on 1.5C being a core objective of the summit ... it is incumbent on us as the host of COP26 to ensure it is."

The government has only recently shown any urgency about giving the conference the priority it needs. But our ability to persuade other countries to act quickly is compromised by a willingness to consider opening a new coal mine in Cumbria and licensing further drilling for oil near the Shetland Islands.

Matt is also the chair of a new working party set up by the Labour Party, exploring, with the active involvement of trades unions, business and climate activists, "how we can decarbonise the economy in a way that is fair to all".

Here in Charlton we have not suffered really extreme weather conditions yet, but have had some torrential rain this summer and, of course, on the bottom road we are breathing in some pretty filthy air, especially in rush hours, which is nothing to what could come.

If the whole world does not confront the challenge of climate change now, vast swathes of the planet could become uninhabitable.

Nowhere is safe and that could include London.





# It's a scam

It has been brought to our attention that there is a man knocking on doors in our area purporting to be from Charlton Central Residents' Association (CCRA) and obtaining personal information from residents on the pretext of enrolling them onto a computer course. This is a SCAM.

Please do not give personal details to anyone you don't know on the doorstep. If this man knocks, decline his offer by telling him you do not deal with cold callers. # Don't be intimidated by anti-social behaviour

As lockdown restrictions ease we have seen an increase in anti-social behaviour around the station, Sainsbury's and the Charlton Church Lane shops.

If you are approached by people asking for money:

- say politely, 'I'd like to help, but I don't have any cash' and walk away. Do not engage them in further discussions.
- don't look away if asked for directions/ are being given a 'hard luck story' etc. as this type of distraction is a common tactic for thieves.
- if they become aggressive, you shouldn't allow yourself to be bullied. Take a deep breath, walk into a nearby business or remain in a public place and if needs be ask for assistance.
- never go out of a public space.
   To help combat this behaviour the

Charlton Central Neighbourhood Watch (see ccnwatch.org) are asking you to do two things:

- first put the numbers for the Safer Neighbourhood Police Team (SNT) into your phone: 0796 699 2585 or 020 3276 0812;
- second, provide the SNT with details of the incident, including time and a description of the person involved in order to help police build up intelligence on this type of crime.

# How happy is my valley?

... A view from the terraces

### Charlton are going nowhere fast!

There's lots of positive rhetoric flowing round the Valley at the moment. Manager Nigel Adkins talks of "building a foundation that will bring stability to the club." He speaks of owner Thomas Sandgaard's long term vision for the future.

Well, I say let's have some shortsightedness. Now! Because, as I write, we are three games in and have chalked up one solitary point.

One draw and two defeats does not represent much progress in my book. Ok, it's early days and we are still bonding as a team with a lot of new faces in the squad. But to be fifth from bottom after three games is not very inspiring for us faithful fans.

The manner of the play has not been

particularly exciting. We didn't manage one shot on goal in the first game. We let Oxford dominate in the

second and it's always going to be hard to lose to a team managed by former Charlton manager Karl Robinson.

However you look at it, this is our worst start to a season for many years which tends to give all the positive pre-season chat something of a hollow ring.

At MK Dons we took an early lead through summer signing Jayden Stockley only to have it pegged back a few minutes later. MK then went on to win.

Our latest signing, 23-year-old winger Charlie Kirk, got in some minutes and looks promising, so perhaps there are some positives to be taken.

Many players were let go during the summer and Adkins has had to embark on a rebuild. The emphasis has been on youth sprinkled with seasoned players to provide stability. That is a risky strategy until the younger elements find their feet, get some experience in and learn the ins and outs of the professional game.

A much stronger midfield presence is needed, for this is where games are won or lost. So far this season we have been distinctly lacklustre in this area and it needs beefing up.

Charlton has always been proud of its academy and we have seen many fine youngsters come through the ranks. Attacking midfielder Albi Morgan is a fine example. He started at the academy and is now a regular in the squad. Others are also showing great promise so it's clear to see why Adkins talks of the long term vision.

Fans are by nature impatient and always want a win. So one point from a possible nine is not impressive and guarantees the first mutterings of doubt about current strategy.

Perhaps we should be more reflective and see this "vision of the future" as a gradual process that will take time. But more goals and more wins would be nice. We are still in the transfer market and will need to draw in some established talent if we are to end this poor run of early form and become title contenders.

It is worth noting that when we won our division so convincingly a few years ago, we lost our first five games! It's early days, we have a good manager a solid owner and a great club.

Of course we'll bounce back! Crongers fissed. COYR's!




